

# **Tigers in Roo makeover**

Werribee Football Club will become the fully aligned VFL partner of AFL club North Melbourne from 2016 for at least two

The Tigers and fellow VFL club North Ballarat currently have an agreement with the Kangaroos that splits the Roos' players between both VFL clubs.

That contract will end at the conclusion of the 2015 season.

From 2016, Werribee will take over as the fully aligned partner, meaning all players who are not in the Kangaroos' best team will filter down to the VFL Tigers. Werribee will retain its name, nickname, colours and song, preserving 50 years of history.

Tigers president John Nicol said one of the biggest decisions in the club's history came after "exhaustive" talks between the two clubs and extensive research by the Werribee board and staff. "In the end, the financial and football future of the club saw this as our best option for the 2016 and 2017 seasons.'

John Lamont will stay on as senior coach until at least the end of the 2017 season, as will football manager Stuart Balloch.

Lamont was a development and line coach at North Melbourne before accepting the head coaching position at Werribee at the start of last season.

"The relationship between the two clubs is very strong, very healthy and has produced good results," he said.

"Werribee has developed players like Ben Brown and Luke McDonald who North has drafted, and we've seen North-listed players like Mason Wood (29 games) and Daniel Currie (30) hone their skills playing for Werribee, all to the benefit of the North Melbourne Football Club.

"We have also seen Ben Ross, Ben Warren and Ben Speight choose to continue their football at Werribee after being delisted by the Kangaroos."

North Melbourne football director Geoff Walsh said the agreement would enhance both clubs' football programs and lead to the Kangaroos having a greater presence in the City of Wyndham.

"Both Werribee and North Melbourne will benefit greatly from the full alignment," Walsh

"We are sure that not only will this decision enhance the football programs of both clubs, but the joint approach will further imprint our game in the western region.

'The full alignment will see the North Melbourne Football Club and its players become even more present in the City Wyndham, adding to the community programs and initiatives already run by the

North Melbourne is not taking over the Tigers – it will supply players and other personnel. Werribee is facing a very challenging 2016 season. The proposed redevelopment of Avalon Airport Oval means finding an alternative training venue and home ground for a year. Arden Street may be the saviour. Werribee has done well with the partial alignment, making four finals appearances. But when you look at Footscray, Box Hill and Geelong, the talent gap is widening. I am keen to hear from Tigers fans about this. Yes, I work for the club as media manager. And personally, I think this will be good for the long-term future of the Tigers.

## In-form O'Brien sends bowlers a warning

Bowlers beware. Star Werribee batsman Tim O'Brien is hitting his straps in the run-up to Christmas.

O'Brien blasted a magnificent 127 in the Tigers' massive 6-341 against Preston in the Victorian Sub-District match at Preston City Oval on Saturday.

After a relatively slow start to the season with 25, 1 and 20 in his first three digs, O'Brien has made 48 not out and a century in his last two outings to signal that he's back to his best form.

Last summer, the No.4 batsman accumulated 525 runs, including two tons, at 52, while the season before he made 739 at 73 to be one of the cornerstones of a side that went all the way to the grand final.

If the Tigers want to make waves in this competition, they'll need O'Brien at his best, and he's starting to get into his groove.

It took a team effort from the Tigers to compile what should be a match-winning score. Opener Matt Dean continued his sizzling start with 72.

Contributions came from middle-order batsmen James Freeman (40no), Heath Pritchard (33no) and captain Shaun Dean (26).

The Tigers are preparing for a busy weekend, with the second day of the clash with Preston on Saturday, followed by their first 'Movember' charity Twenty20 game against Hoppers Crossing.

November is when men grow moustaches to raise awareness of men's health issues, including encouraging regular medical checks, early cancer detection and adopting a healthier lifestyle.

Werribee and Hoppers Crossing plan to make it an annual event with the home venues alternating.

The inaugural contest will take place at Werribee's Chirnside Park on Sunday, with an under-21 game at 11am followed by the Movember Challenge at 2pm.

There will be a barbecue and raffle, with all proceeds going to the Movember Foundation.
